“School Shootings: A Survivor’s Perspective”

topic in light of the school shooting so close to home this week, she (and others) thought a shift in topic might be appropriate.

Amanda is a school shooting survivor, an activist with Moms Demand Action who went to speak to our state legislators this past week and is trained to counsel survivors. In addition, as mom of a nonbinary child, she is also concerned about possible ramifications to our trans community.

Deanna notes, “I can think of no one better equipped to help us process big feelings in the aftermath of a tragedy close to home. I hope you can join her Sunday for this important discussion.”

(Side note, we still plan to have her back to talk about biodiversity).



Leila Howell (April 9)  
“History and Use of Magical Dolls”

Leila is a displaced member of UUCS and the former Children's Religious Education teacher. She is a member of the Unitarian Universalist Covenant of Pagans. She currently resides in Oak Ridge, TN with her partner and children where she spends her

days as an HR Director and her spare time making crafts and studying magical practices. Spiritual practices include tarot, ancestral veneration, and poppet magic (literally 'witch crafts').

Having loved dolls all her life, Leila has studied not only the history and use of magic dolls but also traditional dollmaking methods from different cultures. 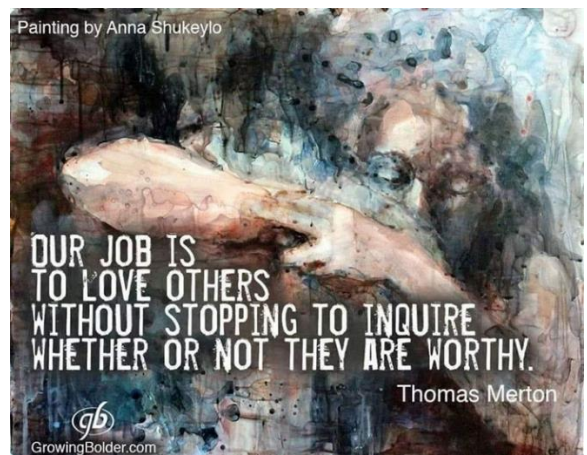
Jeannie Alexander (April 16)

Rev. Jeannie Alexander is the founder and former director of No Exceptions Prison Collective, which she founded in collaboration with prisoners after serving as the head prison chaplain of Riverbend Maximum Security Prison for five years. She is also a former lawyer and professor of religion and philosophy. She holds a law degree from Cornell University and a Masters in Religious Studies with a focus on Ethics and Mysticism. She is published in both journals and books and has collaborated with and been a subject in multiple documentaries. As the co-founder and Co-Abbess of Earthfire Abbey, she cultivates and collaborates with the Earth to feed her community, is a writer, abolitionist, anti-fascist, organizer, midwife to the dying, a daughter, a wife, lover of all things wild, worships in bogs, and is a walker of rivers.

Rob Spirko is serving on the Article II Study Commission for the Unitarian Universalist Association. He has worked with EqUUal Access and the UUA's Southern Region Adjunct Staff team. He joined Tennessee Valley UU Church in 2003, and became involved in Foothills UU Fellowship in Maryville when it started up in 2006. He joined as a member in 2009. He's served there as a worship leader, religious educator, Board Secretary and President, and helped hire FUUF's first minister. He works as a Senior Lecturer at the University of Tennessee, where he's also the co-chair of the Chancellor's Commission for Disability.

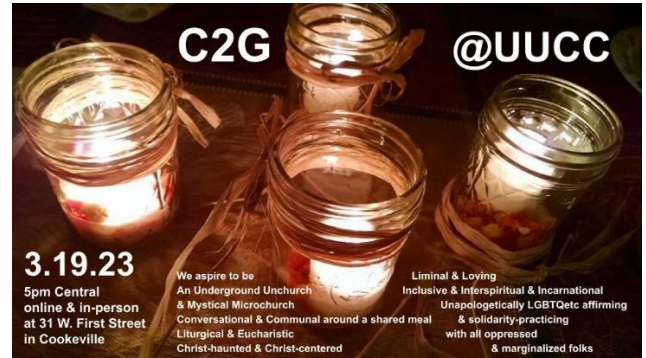
publication award for an article published in 2022.

**INTRO TO UU: STEWARDSHIP**

If you are new to the Unitarian Universalist faith tradition or just curious about us, many of the practices and ceremonies may be different from what you have experienced in other places of worship. Sometimes the symbolism is best defined by the viewpoint of the individual congregant.

Stewardship is a commitment to service in the wider world. <sup>11</sup> Everybody forever is gonna be talking about how Jesus is the be-all end-all because of that.

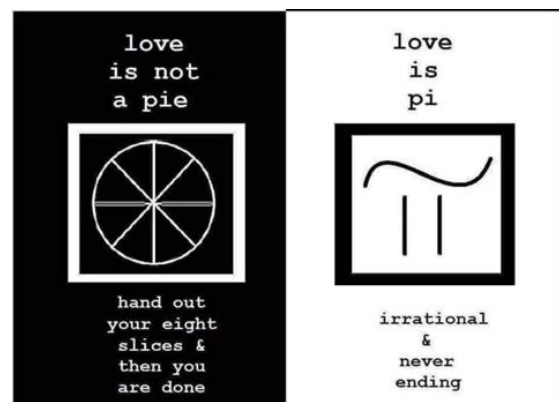

UUCC’s Board of Directors discussed several good news topics during this month’s regularly scheduled meeting.

First, the Board considered a letter from our landlady who had originally planned to increase UUCC’s monthly rent. However, she considered the Board’s proposal that we congregants paint the space and delay the rent increase by 12 months. She wrote to the Board that she accepted the proposal! Of course, the landlady wished to be consulted regarding the chosen colors, which the Board readily agreed. Congregants will meet Sun., April 9, after services (about noonish) to paint. Before COVID slowed down the world, UUCC enjoyed a monthly potluck. Potluck is back! The Board voted for the fourth Sunday of every month to be potluck Sunday for after services.

Sometime in June, UUCC will vote on the 2023-2024 Board. Members currently slated to run include: Norma, president; Cassandra, resident-elect; treasurer, Sandra; secretary, Carol; members-at-large, Richard and Kathleen. If you would like to run for one of these positions, please let anyone on the current Board know.

The Board voted to hold a spring auction using the on-line platform “Better World.” Details will be forthcoming.

The newest social justice activity is Safe Affordable Good Energy (SAGE), which is lead by Richard. Please see him for further information.

### Treasury Report

### Additional Income:

Part of the total income for 2023 comes from use of our building by other groups (\$200), the Kroger Community Rewards Program (\$58), the Amazon Smile Program (\$41), and the Fair-Trade Project (\$159 returned on \$81 in supplies thus far). If you have any questions about these programs, please talk to any Board member or consult the web page.

### 2023 Challenges – Maybe:

This new year promises to be very trying. We have pledges to cover only about 83% of the posted budget. Although \$1,858 will be carried over from a 2022 fund-raiser, \$400 of the \$1,200 rent increase for 2023 is not included in the 2023 budget. Since UUCC monthly expenses vary greatly, monthly prorated expenses will be posted in 2023 with a running deficit total displayed.

\*[ \$26,149 (posted budget) + \$400 (rent increase) - \$1,858 (2022 fund raiser)] / 12 = \$2,058. Any month where the income is less than \$2,058 will add to a running deficit.

However:

We did sign a new lease Sun., March 26. The signed lease sites the increased rent amount, and we were told that as long as the painting occurs before May 1, that the landlady will add an addendum waiving the increase for one year.

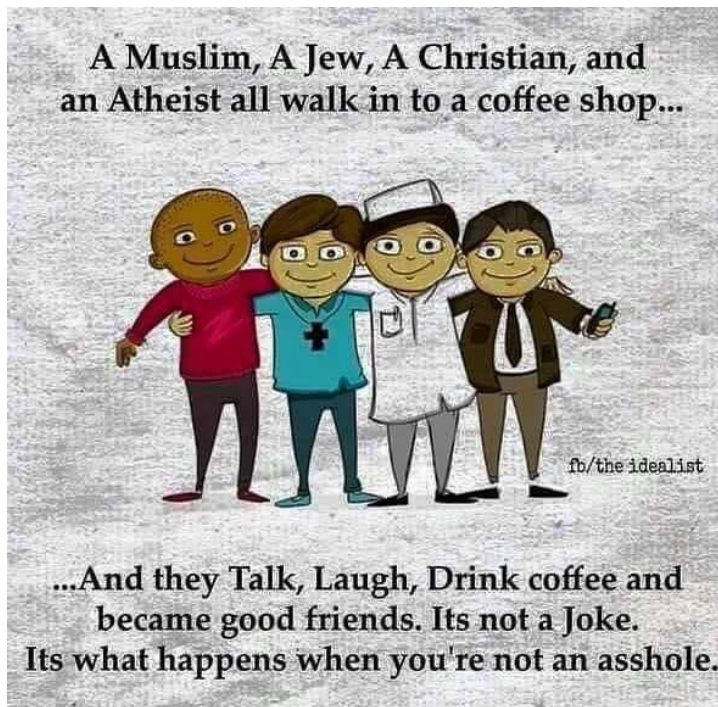
